## **Updated media release:**

<u>Updated on 4 May 2023:</u> Further to our media release on 26 April 2023, The Orange Lantern Gourmet Kitchen Pte Ltd was fined \$4,000 by the court yesterday for permitting its premises to be used as an unlicensed fish processing establishment. Its Director, Sim Lai Heng, was also fined \$4,000 for failing to prevent the offence from being committed.

SFA's investigations revealed that the Aljunied Avenue 4 premises, which was used by Fish Vision Agro-Tech Pte Ltd to illegally operate a fish processing establishment on 4 October 2022, was licensed to The Orange Lantern Gourmet Kitchen Pte Ltd to conduct food catering. It was not licensed to conduct food processing.

# Fish Vision Agro-Tech Pte Ltd and its Director fined \$4,000 each for illegally operating an unlicensed fish processing establishment

Fish Vision Agro-Tech Pte Ltd was fined \$4,000 by the court today for illegally operating an unlicensed fish processing establishment. Its Director, Chew Kim Hwee, was also fined \$4,000 for failing to prevent the offence from being committed.

- On 4 October 2022, Singapore Food Agency (SFA) officers found Fish Vision Agro-Tech Pte Ltd illegally operating a fish processing establishment at a premises in Aljunied Avenue 4. Fish processing activities observed at the premises include the descaling, degutting and washing of raw whole fish.
- 3 Investigations revealed that the premises was not licensed to conduct food processing.

Illegal processing of seafood at unlicensed facilities pose a food safety risk. In Singapore, all food processing for meat and seafood products must be licensed and are required to meet SFA's requirements and food safety standards. These licensed

premises are also routinely inspected by SFA to ensure compliance. Offenders who process meat and/or fish products illegally shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$10,000 and/or imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year.
